One night, while lost in the nearby desert, Nathan finds someone extraordinary: a holy being from the Navajo Creation Story--a Water Monster--in need of help.




Graphic Novels




Cognate Crossword






- 1. Take a page from a newspaper, magazine or damaged book (not a library book though, please!). Or make a copy of a page from a book. You can use the copy machine at your library.





Numbers in Nature

These numbers are the Fibonacci sequence. If you graph the Fibonacci numbers, it creates a spiral.



Plant Identification

Pierce County has many interesting and beautiful native plants. "Native plant" is a term for a plant that occurs naturally in an area. Many plants in gardens and growing in the wild were introduced, accidently or on purpose, from other countries or different parts of the United States. In the U.S., plants are generally considered native if they existed here before European colonialization. Some non-native plants are invasive and crowd out or compete with native plants for space and resources.

Can you find these different types of native plants in your neighborhood, garden, plant nursery or local park? Check off each one as you find them, write down the location where it is and record one descriptive word about the plant that you find interesting. It could be a shape, color, texture, smell or emotion!

Pressed Flowers and Leaves

Collect leaves and flowers to press and preserve. You can use your specimens to make a guide to the plants growing in your garden, neighborhood or local park, or to inspire a host of art and gift projects, including notecards and bookmarks.

Materials:

- · Sheets of scrap paper, newspaper or paper towels
- Cardboard pieces
- A book or two flat objects with some weight
- Glue stick or thinned white glue

Instructions:

- 1. Collect plant material. It's best to collect plants for pressing when they are free of dew or rain. When collecting specimens, don't collect from private property.
- 2. Fold or place the plant in between two sheets of newspaper, paper towels, or other scrap paper. If you are pressing multiple plants, place a layer of cardboard in between each paper wrapped plant.
- 3. Place books (or other heavy flat objects) on top of your paper and cardboard layers. Leave your homemade plant press in a warm, ventilated location to dry for at least ten days.
- 4. When completely dried out, use your pressed plants to decorate notecards, bookmarks, or other objects. Use white glue thinned with water or a glue stick.



Ms. Kelsey at Summit Library loves this graphic novel because it is about trying something new, being terrible at it, but still finding joy and friendship while doing it.






Ms. Brandi at South Hill Pierce County Library recommends this book because it's an excellent collection of short, spooky stories, perfect for anyone who loves scary books!

Ms. Holly at Orting Library loves the short stories about all the different supernatural cats!






Ms. Lisa at Graham Library recommends this graphic novel because it's a game, a maze, a comic and a choose your own adventure all in one!

the west was during the late 1800's.






